

Digital Accessibility Considerations

Accessibility awareness is essential to good slide and video design. Accessibility is not limited to visually or hearing-impaired students and good design should provide a good experience for everyone.

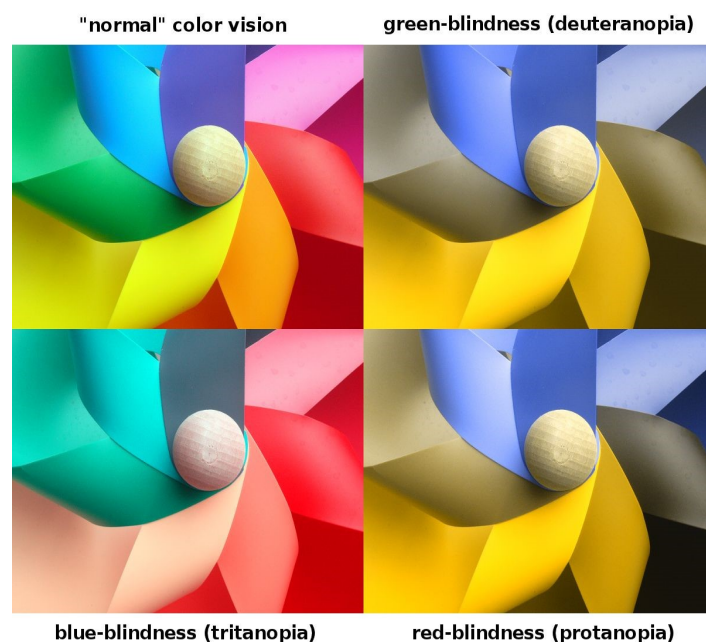
General Concerns

What are some questions you may ask yourself while designing instructional materials?

- Is my slide too busy?
- Do the colors contrast well enough?
- Is this background distracting?
- Is this font easy to read?
- Are my fonts and images large enough?
- Can these colors be distinguished to someone who has color blindness?

Check for Sufficient Color Contrast

An often forgotten but important accessibility item is making sure that a page has sufficient color contrast. Use color thoughtfully in your designs. Download a color contrast analyzer such as this one <http://bit.ly/colour-analyzer>

Check Your Fonts

It's key that any learner is able to quickly and concisely distinguish the text on screen. Use large, legible fonts when making text design choices. A sans serif font will be easier to read by everyone.

Provide Captioning and Descriptive Text

Include image and media alternatives in your design. For example, you might need:

- Visible links to transcripts of audio
- Visible links to audio described versions of videos
- Text along with icons and graphical buttons
- Captions and descriptions for tables or complex graphs
