Enhance Your Undergraduate Education

If you're like most Carnegie Mellon students, you have talents and interests in more than one area. We encourage you to explore electives outside your major, and if you select those courses wisely, you could earn a dual degree, an additional major or a minor in one or more areas. Some students do this by enrolling in summer courses, taking an extra course per semester or staying for an extra semester or year. With the determination to pursue your interests, the possibilities are endless.

Additional Majors

Earn a single degree in two areas by completing the requirements of both areas, using the electives from one program to fulfill the requirements of the other. Most additional majors are completed in more than four years.

Dual Degrees

Earn two degrees (both a BS and/or a BA) from two departments or colleges, although it usually takes longer than four years. Special permission is required.

Minors

Gain a concentration of knowledge from the variety of specialized and interdisciplinary minors available.

Undergraduate Research Opportunities

Students may apply (as often as they like) to the Undergraduate Research Office (URO) for a Small Undergraduate Research Grant (SURG) or a Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) to support projects in any area, the Arts, Humanities, Sciences, Social Sciences, Engineering and Computer Science, as well as across the disciplines. All students who participate in the Undergraduate Research Office programs present at the annual campus-wide May symposium, Meeting of the Minds. There are poster displays, art installations, performances, oral presentations and demonstrations by over 400 students. Computing Resources

Every on-campus residence hall and administrative building is served by a blazingly fast 10Gbps core data network. Our wireless network blankets the campus, spanning millions of square feet and connecting 38,000 devices.

Public computer labs, known as "clusters" offer approximately 400 Macintosh, Windows and Linux computers, as well as color scanners, audio mixers, microphones and other cutting edge equipment. But our clusters are more than hardware—they offer over ninety software titles as well.

An extensive computing environment calls for educated users. A Computing@Carnegie Mellon (C@CM) course is required for all incoming freshmen. The course focuses on our networked resources as well as the student's responsibilities in our computing community.

Campus Security

The Carnegie Mellon University Police Department, with its staff of police officers and security guards, patrols the campus 24 hours a day on foot, by car and bicycle.

The Police Department offers late-evening escort service to academic and residence buildings on campus and official university housing locations within 1.5 miles of campus, regular shuttle bus service to university apartments in Oakland, campus emergency telephones, a free program for registering personal property, monthly tips on crime prevention and safety and security seminars. Intercultural Communication Center (ICC)

The ICC offers support services designed to help nonnative English speakers (international students as well as those who attended high school in the U.S.) succeed in academic programs at Carnegie Mellon. Support services include a writing clinic for individual help with academic reading and writing assignments; language workshops covering topics such as citing sources, presentation skills and reading strategies; tutoring to individually address fluency issues; placement interviews to evaluate spoken language; and the ITA Test (a screening test for any nonnative English speaker who plans to work as a teaching assistant). Resources for Students with Disabilities

Carnegie Mellon makes great efforts to provide physical and programmatic campus access to everyone. Individuals with documented disabilities may be eligible to receive services/accommodations from Carnegie Mellon's Equal Opportunity Services Office (EOS).

To access services/accommodations, individuals must first refer themselves to the EOS office and provide adequate documentation of the disability. The first step in this process is to complete and return the Voluntary Self Identification Form. Students may identify themselves as having a disability at any time. The documentation must come from an outside source. Please note the EOS does not initiate accommodations without a specific written request from an individual with a disability.
