

The Carnegie Mellon University School of Architecture seeks candidates for tenure-track positions to teach in its undergraduate B.Arch program beginning in the Fall of 2012. We are looking for dynamic and innovative educators and practitioners with a dual expertise who are prepared to offer courses within two of the following six specialties:

- design studio, from early design to thesis
- digital media and computing, and their integration in design studio
- digital workflow and fabrication
- information modeling and performance simulation
- design thinking, theory, criticism
- architectural history, including specialists in Asia, the Middle East, or Pre-Modern Europe

Preference will be given to applicants with demonstrated expertise in design studio.

Applicants should submit their materials as a bound document that includes:

- A letter of interest that indicates your specific areas of expertise, a discussion of the specific courses (including studios) that you are prepared to teach, and your longer term plans for practice or research
- Two or more syllabi or detailed course proposals reflecting your two areas of teaching
- A complete c.v.
- Contact information for three references including name, position, employer, email address, and phone number
- For applications in the design or digital streams, a brief portfolio of professional accomplishments plus, for those with prior teaching experience, examples of students' work
- For applications in the design thinking, theory, criticism, or architectural history streams, a writing sample of approximately 20 pages, either published work or manuscript

The course load is typically two courses per semester. Faculty teaching in the studio, digital media, digital fabrication, information modeling and performance simulation, or design thinking streams must hold a Master of Architecture or professional degree with commensurate professional practice. Faculty teaching in the architectural history stream must hold a Ph.D. in an appropriate discipline. All faculty are expected to be actively engaged in (1) teaching, (2) research, scholarship, practice, or artistic activities, and (3) university service.

All applicants are expected to contribute to the mission of the School of Architecture, which is to educate outstanding professionals with design creativity, social responsibility, historical perspective, technical excellence, and global environmental leadership. Graduates of the Carnegie Mellon School of Architecture are design-thinkers who use the act of making to explore, analyze, formulate, fabricate, and represent new ideas about the built environment. Our programs and facilities are widely recognized for providing unique learning experiences at the intersection of art, humanities, science, and technology that enable our students to become

creative and knowledgeable global collaborators who improve the quality of life and the sustainability of the built environment. Carnegie Mellon University School of Architecture offers a NAAB accredited, five-year professional Bachelor of Architecture (B.Arch) degree that is consistently ranked in the top ten professional programs. The School of Architecture also offers post-professional graduate programs in architectural–engineering–construction management, building performance, computational design, sustainable design, tangible interaction design, and urban design.
