Prerequisites

Intermediate-level proficiency in the Arabic language. This is equivalent to the completion of three courses (two at the 100-level and one at the 200-level), or placement or exemption based on Advanced Placement, Cambridge GCE Advanced level, International Baccalaureate or CMU internal placement test scores. In all cases, progress will be accelerated by study abroad, which is highly recommended for all minors. (Study abroad advisor - Dr. Khaled Al Masaeed (masaeed@andrew.cmu.edu).

*Students may double count one course taken for the Arabic Studies minor that is also being used to fulfill the requirements of other majors, minors, and programs. This does not include double-counting with General Education requirements.

CMU-Q students who place out of the core courses as determined by the campus advisor for Arabic Studies must take four (or more) courses from List A courses, conducted in Arabic, and two (or fewer) courses from List B, conducted in English.
