### Videoconference: Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff

The International Relations Program presents a videoconference with Admiral Mike Mullen, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Admiral Mullen was sworn in as the 17th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on October 1, 2007. He serves as the principal military advisor to the President, the Secretary of Defense, the National Security Council, and the Homeland Security Council.

A native of Los Angeles, Admiral Mike Mullen graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1968. He commanded three ships: the gasoline tanker USS *Noxubee* (AOG 56), the guided missile destroyer USS *Goldsborough* (DDG 20), and the guided missile cruiser USS *Yorktown* (CG 48). As a Flag Officer, Adm. Mullen commanded Cruiser-Destroyer Group 2, the George Washington Battle Group, and the U.S. 2nd Fleet/NATO Striking Fleet Atlantic.

Ashore he has served in leadership positions at the Naval Academy, in the Navy's Bureau of Personnel, in the Office of the Secretary of Defense and on the Navy Staff. He was the 32nd Vice Chief of Naval Operations from August 2003 to October 2004.

His last operational assignment was as Commander, NATO Joint Force Command Naples/Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe.

Adm. Mullen is a graduate of the Advanced Management Program at the Harvard Business School and earned a Master of Science degree in Operations Research from the Naval Postgraduate School.

Prior to becoming Chairman, Adm. Mullen served as the 28th Chief of Naval Operations.

### **International Film Festival: "Faces of Mechanization"**

Friday, April 4 – Tuesday, April 15, 2008

Industrialization is increasingly shaping people's day-to-day routines and society as a whole. To explore technology's influence on our lives and communities, the Humanities Center at Carnegie Mellon University presents "Faces of Mechanization," the 2008 Carnegie Mellon International Film Festival, April 4-15.

The festival's lineup includes a collection of eight feature films and documentaries along with a number of shorter works from countries as diverse as Argentina and Austria. The selections cover topics ranging from the processes by which food and clothing are produced for the masses to parents' efforts to take advantage of scientific advances to "design" the perfect child. Four of the films are being shown for the first time in Pittsburgh, and one, Polish director Artur Zmijewski's "Selected Works," is making its American debut.

The festival opens April 4 at Pittsburgh Filmmakers' Melwood Screening Room with Argentinean director Esteban Sapir's "La Antena," a black-and-white silent film in which citizens of a future society live in a voiceless world that is thoroughly controlled by television. This screening in Pittsburgh is only the second time the film has ever been shown at an American film festival.

In addition to the Melwood Screening Room, the festival's films will be shown in McConomy Auditorium in the University Center on Carnegie Mellon's Oakland campus as well as the Squirrel Hill and Manor theatres in Pittsburgh's Squirrel Hill neighborhood. General admission tickets are \$7 for the public and \$3 for students, and a festival pass can be purchased for \$30 (\$15 for students). Tickets for the opening night screening of "La Antena" and reception are \$8 for the public and \$5 for students.

**Lecture: "Indianizing Film: Decolonization and the Question of Technology"**

A talk by Freya Schiwy, Assistant Professor of Latin American Media and Cultural Studies, University of California, Riverside. Indigenous videos partake in the cultural politics of indigenous movement organizations that wish to revitalize and vindicate modes of knowing and forms of transmitting social memory. Indigenous fiction and documentary films from the Andean-Amazonian region tend to rely on the genres and formulas familiar from Hollywood cinema and conventional documentaries, such as the horror movie, the melodrama, ubiquitous close-ups and talking heads. This formulation of an indigenous gaze could not be more distinct from the anti-colonial, experimental solutions to Hollywood's cultural imperialism Third Cinema offered in the 1960s. This talk explores two interrelated questions: What is the relation between traditional indigenous modes and forms of knowledge and video aesthetics? How do indigenous media conceptualize the notion of decolonization in the age of multiculturalism? The talk will be followed by screenings of three indigenous fiction videos from Bolivia. Freya Schiwy is Assistant Professor of Latin American Media and Cultural Studies at the University of California, Riverside. She is co-editor of *Indisciplinar las Ciencias Sociales*, Quito, 2002. Dr. Ellen Frost is a Visiting Fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics and an Adjunct Research Fellow at the National Defense University's Institute of National Strategic Studies. Her recently published book, *Asia's New Regionalism*, analyzes the Asian integration movement, assesses China's growing regional influence, and derives implications for U.S. policy.

Dr. Frost has served in the U.S. government as Counselor to the U.S. Trade Representative and Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Economic

and Technology Affairs. She was also the Corporate Director for International Affairs in the Washington office of United Technologies Corporation and Director for U.S.-Japan Relations in the Washington office of Westinghouse Electric Corporation.

### **Conference: "The International Human Rights Regime Since 9/11: Transatlantic Perspectives"**

The terrorist attacks of 11 September 2001 in the United States and subsequent attacks in Madrid and London have made combating terrorism a chief priority of U.S. and European governments. Some of the policies those governments have adopted raise serious human rights concerns – including detention and interrogation practices and "pre-emptive" military action. It is easy to conclude from such practices that the events and aftermath of 9/11 have created a severe shock to the international human rights regime.

Despite the obvious and important concerns these new policies raise, this conclusion is too quick, raising more questions than it answers. What exactly is the international human rights regime? What changes has it undergone since 9/11, and (how) can those changes be attributed to events related to 9/11? How do obvious changes in national policy (foreign and domestic) impact the regime? How do these changes differ in Europe and the United States, and how do the differences play out internationally? Was 9/11 a significant turning point for human rights? In what ways? Does 9/11 provide a useful analytic frame for thinking about human rights and about changes in the human rights regime?

This conference, being held in cooperation with the *Deutsche Vereinigung für Politische Wissenschaft* (DVPW – German Political Science Association) ad hoc group on Human Rights, will convene scholars from Europe and the U.S. to debate these and related questions. We want to take seriously the important events of 9/11 and assess their impact on the international human rights regime without taking the nature or extent of that impact for granted.
