Curriculum Overview

The School of Music provides you with superb, individualized coaching in large and small ensembles — whether it's an orchestra, chorus, wind ensemble or chamber ensembles. You'll achieve the highest standards of discipline and musicianship as you work toward a solid foundation in musical skills and knowledge. Our music core curriculum includes music theory, music history, aural skills, repertoire/listening, music technology and entrepreneurship courses, as well as Dalcroze Eurhythmics — a kinesthetic approach to musicianship training.

Starting with your sophomore year, you may apply for the Music Education Certification program, which extends your time at the school by one semester to allow for student teaching. This innovative program has a 100% placement rate. Additionally, you'll have the chance to expand your knowledge base outside of music by taking courses across Carnegie Mellon.

Throughout your studies, you'll prepare for the travel, leaps of faith and business decisions that go hand in hand with a career in music. Music Entrepreneurship teaches marketing, taxes, working with donors and nonprofits, concert attire, etiquette and role preparation. Additional opportunities for growth include study abroad, research and extracurricular activities that reinforce the business, people skills and overall savvy that you'll need as a successful working artist.
