
The Annual Margaret Morrison Distinguished Lecture in Women's History

Mothers of Gynecology: A Conversation with Artist and Activist Michelle Browder



Upon first learning about James Marion Sims, the selfappointed and celebrated father of modern gynecology, who developed his surgical techniques by brutally experimenting upon enslaved and poor women, Browder wondered: how can I change the narrative?

Over the past decade, Browder has led a powerful campaign to revive the stories of the women upon whom Sims experimented and created highly-publicized artworks. Most recently, she purchased Sims's old hospital in Montgomery, Alabama, to create a training facility for Black midwives and to continue her educational mission to center Black people's ongoing struggles to access the safe medical care that their genius & bodies helped pioneer.
