



# Transnational/Global Food History

Carnegie Mellon's Department of History seeks applicants for a **Ph.D. in History focused on Transnational/Global Food History**.

We especially encourage applicants whose interests connect food history with the history of social movements / social change. Successful applicants will work primarily with professors Edda Fields-Black, Nico Slate, and John Soluri, while benefitting from the range of faculty, courses, seminars, and other resources available at CMU and the nearby University of Pittsburgh.

**Our program** is small by design, and students receive an exceptional level of individual attention from faculty. The program strongly emphasizes research, and all students participate in a year-long research seminar. We also offer several opportunities for students to develop skills that are useful in the academy and beyond:

- a workshop in digital humanities methods that draws on Carnegie Mellon's strength in computing and technology;
- a workshop on public and applied history;
- interdisciplinary coursework at CMU and the University of Pittsburgh

**Our Internship Program** allows students to receive full funding while completing a semester-long internship. Internships may be located in Pittsburgh or elsewhere, and can be completed at museums, national parks, nonprofit organizations, government agencies, corporations, or anywhere historical research is required.

**Our faculty members** have won multiple awards for research and teaching. Their interests cut across national and temporal boundaries.

**Our financial package** includes tuition, health insurance, fees, and a stipend. In addition, we offer several additional scholarships and research grants that make it possible for our students to attend conferences and to conduct research across the United States and abroad.
