## The U.S. Constitution & the Presidency (79-248)

This course explores the changing role and powers of the American Presidency under the Constitution, from the founding era through the twentieth century. After absorbing drafting and ratification debates, we will focus on how certain presidents established or expanded executive power and how particular conflicts (Wars, Inequality, Terrorism, Impeachments) restructured or restricted presidential powers.

Readings will include the U.S. Constitution (of course), parts of *The Federalist Papers*, biographical chapters on selected presidents from Ken Gormley's *The Presidents and the Constitution*, and three short books: Daniel Farber's *Lincoln's Constitution*, Corey Brettschneider's *The Oath and the Office: A Guide to the Constitution for Future Presidents*, and Cass Sunstein's *Impeachment: A Citizen's Guide*.

Grading will be based on three short essays, a final paper, and well-prepared participation in discussion (which, of course, requires attendance). Weights are as follows: first short essay (10%); second short essay (15%); third short essay (20%); final paper (25%); participation (20%); and a handwritten assignment that can be submitted any time before October 22 (10%).
