What exactly are scientific conferences?

A designated place where scholars come together to present their research findings across various formats (e.g., posters, talks, panels), present awards to people for their work, sometimes around a general theme

Sometimes official business of the organization is discussed

Why are scientific conferences important?

Learn about the newest research across many areas within a field Be exposed to new techniques/skills that you can apply to your work

Statistical techniques, methodologies, recruitment strategies

Network with others in and our of your area

Expose others to your work

What do you get out of attending them? Why should I attend?

Learn how to communicate your ideas in a clear, efficient way

Improve your presentation skills

Get mentored by others!

Feedback on your work

You can put it on your CV (if you present)

Learn about new research

Improve your networking skills

Find collaborators

Conference Attendance Etiquette

- There's a lot to see, so it can be helpful to plan in advance
 - Balance between content (your specialty versus others), professional development, and rest
- Communicate with others
 - Talk to people after talks and during breaks; take a buddy with you if you feel nervous
 - Communicate via social media (using hashtags, etc)
- Follow up with new contacts after the conference!
- Attend the social events, but remember this is still a professional event
- Aesthetic presentation: Make a good impression!

- 1. American Psychological Association (APA)
 - · Largest psychological organization representing US psychologists
- 2. Association for Psychological Science (APS)
 - Advance the science of psychology nationally and in the international community
- 3. Society for Personality and Social Psychology (SPSP)
 - Social and personality psychology centered
- 4. American Psychosomatic Society (APS)
 - Health psychology centered (more experimental work, no clinical work)

Example National Scientific Conferences

- 5. Society for Behavioral medicine
 - Health psychology focused but on clinical interventions
- 6. Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI)
 - Focused on important social and policy issues
- 7. American Public Health Association (APHA)
 - Focused on public health and epidemiology (interventions!)
- 8. National LGBT Health Conference
 - Focused on the health of LGBTQ
