# CARNEGIE MELLON UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS FALL SEMESTER 2006

#### **Athletics at Carnegie Mellon**

Just as Carnegie Mellon University has evolved into one of the nation's leading private research universities, its athletic program has developed and extended its successes over the years. While early successes in the 1900's were primarily in football, baseball and track, many of the most recent achievements have been in such sports as soccer and swimming, among the 17 intercollegiate sports sponsored by the University.

Carnegie Mellon is a member of the Division III in the NCAA and of the University Athletic Association. It operates its sports programs in the belief that athletics are an integral part of the student experience. The lessons learned on the practice and playing fields and arenas are permanent ones and often have more impact because of the nature of sports.

#### Fraternity & Sorority Life at Carnegie Mellon, Spring 2006


The Greek tradition at Carnegie Mellon University began nearly 100 years ago with the founding of the first fraternity on campus, Theta Xi, in 1912. The Panhellenic sorority community was founded in 1945, by Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, Kappa Alpha Theta and Kappa Kappa Gamma. Since then, Greek life at Carnegie Mellon has earned a rich history, offering students opportunities to experience leadership development, serve the local Pittsburgh community, network with alumni and make lifelong friendships.

**Membership:** During the spring semester of 2006, the Greek community consisted of 26 active fraternities and sororities: 5 Panhellenic sororities; 12 Interfraternity Council fraternities; 4 Asian American groups, 2 fraternities and 2 sororities; and 4 National Pan-Hellenic (historically African American) chapters represented on campus (3 fraternities and 1 sorority). Of Carnegie Mellon's undergraduates, 965 were members of social Greek-letter organizations. This number reflected 18.3 % of the campus population.


**Scholarship:** Academically, 8 chapters (32%) earned average QPAs higher than the undergraduate average of 3.15. The All-Greek average QPA was 2.85.

**Community and Campus Contributions:** In the spring semester, the fraternity and sorority community contributed 3,459 hours of community service. Individual chapters raised a total of \$23,760 for local, national and international charities. Of active Greek members, 65% reported involvement in other campus organizations, 32% of whom served in leadership roles. Chapter officers implemented approximately 40 educational programs for their members and the larger Carnegie Mellon community.

The Office of International Education ("OIE") promotes and facilitates study abroad and acts as a liaison to the university for foreign students, researchers, and professors. OIE provides many services. We:

- \* Advise international students and scholars regarding personal, immigration/visa, academic, social, and acculturation issues.
- \* Advise students who wish to study abroad regarding programs and options.
- \* Inform foreign students and scholars about changes in immigration regulations and about upcoming events via email and the OIE web site.
- \* Plan workshops on cultural adjustment, reentry issues, career planning, tax filing, and other topics.
- \* Supports and advises to international and cultural groups such as the International Student Union and the International Spouses and Partners Organization.
- \* Organize orientation programs for new students and scholars as well as CMU students who study abroad.
