Tod Hunt is a Trustee of the Roy A. Hunt Foundation and a Director of the Elmhurst Corporation. He has served on the Board of Trustees of Carnegie Mellon University since 1996 and chairs its Property and Facilities Committee. He is also a member of the Board's Executive and Finance Committees, the University's Campus Design and Facilities Development Design Review Committee, and has co-chaired Advisory Board meetings of the University Libraries, the Athletics Department, and the School of Architecture.

Tod also serves on the Boards of the Carnegie Museum of Natural History and the Shadyside Hospital Foundation, and as a Trustee Emeritus of Historical Society of Western Pennsylvania and its Heinz History Center. He is Chairman of the Board of Directors of Allegheny Cemetery and Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors of Homewood Cemetery and a member of the Advisory Board of the Center for Latin American Studies at the University of Pittsburgh.

Previously, Tod served on the Boards of Trustees of the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, the Pittsburgh Dance Council, Shadyside Hospital, the Children's Center of Pittsburgh, St. Edmund's Academy, the World Affairs Council of Pittsburgh, The Experiment in International Living (now called World Learning), and as a member of the National Council of National Parks Conservation Association. He was a Director of the former Pittsburgh Testing Laboratory and an owner of Dahlia Development Company.

Tod attended the Choate School in Connecticut, Le Rosey in Switzerland, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he played Varsity Soccer and served as an officer of Sigma Chi Fraternity. Upon graduation, he received his Bachelor's Degree and an Officer's Commission through the Naval ROTC program, and then served as the Combat Information Center Officer aboard a Destroyer. He subsequently received his Master's Degree in International Administration at the School for International Training in Vermont and worked in Argentina and Washington, DC prior to returning to his hometown of Pittsburgh. He and his wife, Mary Caroline, have four married children and six grandchildren (so far).
