- (Carolina Velez) Will there be spots or signs?

- (Marcela Partida) Why not align resources to make the loop with the waterfront?
 - They are looking to replace the shuttle system in the waterfront.
- (Mana Ameri) How much?
 - About 15 thousand a year.
- (Vivake Prasad) Where is the money coming from?
 - From the normal funds—student senate, campus life, etc.
- (Thomas Tuttle) Have you looked into using the same company so that it'd be cheaper?
 - We have Duquesne uses a private company.
- (Diane Lee) Do you know how many students ride the shuttle to the Waterfront? My concern is that people don't use their resources.
 - According to the Duquesne President it is one of their most successful things.
- (Marcela Partida) I think this a really good idea and I'm happy someone is taking the initiative to do it.
- (Thomas Tuttle) If it runs at later hours then I think it will be very useful.
- (Natalie Morris) As a freshman, Port Authority is really intimidating.
- (Zach Pierce) I feel like as college students, we can figure out the Port Authority schedule.
 - It's a reliable system.
- (Vivake Prasad) I agree with Zach but there's still no guarantee a bus will come.
- (Jared Itkowitz) Any other locations missing?
- (Stephanie Schneider) Probably don't want to many stops
- (Miriam Cha) Use weekends.
 - It runs 6pm to 3am on Friday and Saturday.
- (Thomas Tuttle) Add a 5th and Craig for the Oakland apartments.

- (Cassandra Abernathy) I think it's a good idea and will boost spirit.
- (Zach Stockwell) There are no fountains on Campus, and I find it a complete travesty. Most Universities have a sign fountain. I think that would look really sharp.
- (Stuti Pandey) I think it'll boost community spirit. However, did you consider other alternatives?
- (Natalie) I personally like the cross walk idea. Can you really paint it though?
 - We have a meeting this week
- (Marcela Partida) Have you talked yet with someone from FMS about their opinions?
 - Yes.
- (Thomas Tuttle) I think the perimeter flags are a great idea. I think the crosswalk would be harder than

it seems, not much better.

- (Vivake Prasad) What about around Margret Morrison Street since it is a less safe crosswalk. Universities master plan to make the campus more visible. Have you made sure you collaborated with their plan? Perhaps have this as a cheaper alternative.
- (Keshav Raghavan) How far?
 - If possible we would want to extend it father down Forbes.
- (Thomas Tuttle) Look at alternative, like flags with reflective ink.

5:40 Special Business Bookstore Manager

- Suggestions on the Bookstore.
- Speak about pricing issues from the Bookstore's perspective.
- Common perception is that it's trying to rip off students.
- It's a primary function is to serve students needs.
- Why it's so expensive?
 - Only 4% goes to income for the Bookstore. 75% goes to the publisher. 12% goes to the author of the book. Have to pay for operations, employees, freight, etc.
 - The 4% allows the Bookstore to stay on campus.
 - Helps the environment by reducing packaging.
 - Know what is asked by the professor.
 - Immediacy is another advantage.
- Specifics regarding pricing:
 - 4 major publishers. They increase their prices every year. They are the suppliers that set the prices.
 - Out margin is small compared to most retailers.
 - Trying to get more used copies. Have 8 used venders.
 - Looking into eTextbooks.

5:50 Questions

- (Michael He) I noticed with some online textbooks, like physics, they are sometimes half the price. Why?
 - We have to go through suppliers. It's most likely students.
 - What stops you from getting books at the same price?
 - We just don't have the means. We get books at the market value with a small discount.
- (Vivake Prasad) Return policy the first Friday of the semester. Many students don't have finalized schedules by that time.
 - Few years ago it was more lenient. Students would use the Bookstore as a lending library while they were waiting for their textbooks to arrive from online orders.
- (Keshav Raghavan) One is 160 in hardcover but the paperback was much cheaper. Why don't you order that one?
 - Paperbacks aren't usually available in the United States, usually only international copies have that option, which isn't available from domestic suppliers. Always get the cheapest option.
- (Benjamin Trump) Out of print books?
 - Very scarce.
- (Thomas) Do you get a higher markup on books?
 - Always sell 75% on the new price. There is always a ~25% markup for operational

costs.

- (Stuti Pandey) Paper binding books?
 - A lot goes into the binding and copyrights. Has to do with it being a small run but lots of costs involved.
- (Aaron Gross) Would it be possible to make the search easier on the bookstore website?
 - The software on the website is associated with all the software they use. May be able to add the title of the class in the database.
- (Cassandra) Office supplies prices are much higher in the Bookstore?
 - We are not able to buy it in the same bulk. Probably paying for the convenience.
- (Jared Itkowitz) Regarding return policy, what about getting a reduced amount for a book return if it's after the deadline?
- (Kush) Princeton uses the Kindel.
 - Could look into that if that's what students are interested in reading. Don't have a way of integrating that yet.
- (Thomas Tuttle) Do a pilot of the e book first.
- (Paul Combe) Regarding returns, what about having a store credit system?
 - Still not feasible because of the costs.
 - Digital rights management—using more than one computer.
- (Chansaly Ker) Do you have the data on how much money you are losing?
 - We don't have the figures from the most recent book run. What to make sure what we are doing is what the campus wants. We are not going out of business anytime soon.
- (Stuti Pandey) New vs. used?
 - Publisher sometimes put out new editions to get more money. In that case the Bookstore cannot purchase any more used copies. Could have better luck if professors put in their textbooks on a timelier basis.
- (Zach Stockwell) Online personal ordering went bankrupt because a clothing vender went out of business. Are you finding another supplier?
 - There shouldn't be problems from companies that are still in business.
- (Kush Mangal) Book rental. Has the Bookstore ever tried book rentals?
 - We haven't tried that here. The professor would have to agree on a certain edition of a textbook that they would use over several years. Otherwise money is lost.
- (Zach Pierce) Regarding book buy back. Can you buy/ sell back books according to their condition?
 - Logistically might be difficult.
- (Vivake Prasad) Managing supplies. Has the store ever considered collaborating with other Universities on supplies?
 - UPitt and Carnegie Mellon are the only independent stores. In terms of used books supplies, there really is a limited supply.
- (Miriam Cha) Inter-library loan. Can we utilize something like that, a book lending system?
 - It would have to be a different model here. We would have to buy all of the books.
- (Timi) Put constraints on professors.
 - Deadline for this semester was November 10th.
- (Krishan Taylor) Return policies: any chance of those being implanted next semester of year.
 - Probably not this semester but possibly next year.
- (Stuti Pandey) Show a slip with a dropped class to get a full refund.
- Closing remarks: Office in Bookstore on lower level.
